

WELL KNOWN MERCHANT GONE BANKRUPT

Merchant Seyfert, a highly respected trader and investor was admitted to a mental institution in central London yesterday, after several creditors forced him to declare his bankruptcy.

Mr. Seyfert, a business man who is held in high regard among investors and leading corporate chiefs was declared bankrupt yesterday after failing to meet his creditors demand of an estimated £40 million.

Apparently, Seyfert had deposited his fortune in his dead wife's body, in form of two highly exquisite diamonds constituting her eyes. Two diamonds now missing from her skull, supposedly due to a burglary.

A flagship gone down

According to sources in the financial stratum of London, Mr. Seyfert had worked up a huge debt due to several sunken merchant ships, a decline in key sales areas as well as several failed investments in Spain. While worried, Seyfert continued to operate his businesses, asserting outwardly towards his suppliers, partners and clients, that he

had sufficient assets to withstand the temporary adversity. In the recent months, these claims have become hollower by the minute, as the list of unpaid creditors has grown.

A family secret

The growing pressure from creditors yesterday forced Seyfert to confess the nature of his financial situation. After the tragic death of his wife, he ordered her body embalmed and exhibited in his bedroom, decorated with his most precious pieces of jewelry. Two sparklings diamonds, supposedly holding a market value of no less than £50 million. According to

Seyfert these diamonds were recently stolen, effectively eradicating his ability to discharge his debts.

From luxuries to lunacy

Realizing the imminent collapse of his extravagant lifestyle, Mr. Seyfert began wandering around in a puzzled and confused state on the streets outside his stylish apartment located in one of Londons upper class neighbourhoods. Witnesses have told our photographer that Seyfert had been chanting his wife's name all morning, a chanting that eventually developed into a startling rage. At 2 PM, Seyfert reportedly walked onto a neighbour's

property attempting to break faucets on the fountains and cause damage to statues. Shocked by Seyfert's excessive outburst of rage, the neighbour called the authorities and 25 minutes later, Seyfert was arrested and taken to a court house, only to be taken to a secured mental institution.

Repercussions

Due to Seyfert's bankruptcy, his four personally owned businesses has been suspended indefinitely, leaving more than 800 workers unemployed. Stock declines have been observed for several of his main partners.

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
